## Status of Haiti

Very little has changed in the past six months since our summer newsletter. As of the end of 2025, around 1,000 military personnel, mostly from Kenya, with smaller contingents from Jamaica, Bahamas, Belize, Guatemala, and El Salvador are present in Haiti. The UN-backed Multinational Security Support (MSS) Force for Haiti is authorized to deploy 5,500

soldiers. It is unclear what is holding up the deployment of the additional 4,500 troops but we pray the gang violence stops. There are still daily kidnappings and murders and commerce is operating at a snail's pace. Essentials of daily living are challenging to procure and are more expensive than normal. Please pray for Haiti, her people and an end to the violence.

## RWM Ministry Activities Currently “On Hold”

As you may recall, gang activities began to rise in 2020 as Covid-19 was sweeping the globe. The winter 2019/2020 mission trip was the last cycle where I took teams into Haiti. I made three more solo trips to Haiti, only myself, before the gang violence reached the point that I no longer felt safe. Therefore, all activities that require a team have been placed on hold, to include:

1. Servicing our 30 clinic partners (I still receive emails and offer advice from afar)
2. Performing mass screening programs to identify new diseases that need our attention
3. Conducting mobile clinics in remote areas of Haiti
4. Conducting eye clinics in conjunction with mobile clinics
5. Conducting women’s health clinics in conjunction with mobile clinics
6. Continued construction of the interior of the Sickle Care Center

At one time, these activities were the backbone of our work. While the instability in Haiti has discontinued these activities, we are now focusing on other important activities.

## RWM Ministry Activities Currently “In Focus”



Our primary focus during this time is our Labsco business. The original Labsco in Haut-Limbe, in the north of Haiti, is doing well, all things considered. In a country experiencing the worst economic challenges in her history, we are not setting sale records. However, sales continue to grow and the franchisee, Elio, continues to find new local supply lines. Gang violence has not embedded itself

in the north, so Labsco is not in immediate danger.

We are still in the process of opening a second Labsco in Gonaive, in the central plateau (Artibolite) area of Haiti, with a long-term ministry partner, Eben-Ezer Mission. RWM has worked with Eben-Ezer Mission and her leaders, Pastor Michel Morisset, since 2005. Gonaives is affected by gang violence but not to the degree of Port-au-Prince, which is the epicenter of gang activity. Nonetheless, moving forward with the launch of Labsco Gonaives is slow.

Our secondary focus is the sickle cell program. While progress on finishing the Sickle Care Center building in Saint Marc Haiti is on hold, I am working with another ministry partner, Partners of the Americas, to establish sickle cell partners in Haiti.

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## RWM Ministry Activities Currently “In Focus”

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We are starting with St. Nicholas Hospital in Saint Marc, the same city as the Sickle Care Center building. Our goal is to establish a relationship so St. Nicholas hospital can use our testing and treatment systems to improve and expand care to their patients with sickle cell disease. This allows us to move ahead in three areas:

1. To have a positive impact on sickle cell patients while we wait for Haiti to stabilize;
2. To evaluate our testing and treatment systems in advance;
3. Create a network within the sickle cell healthcare community to support our future work through the Sickle Care Center.

In addition to expanding our network in Haiti, the third focus is to establish relationships within the sickle cell healthcare community in parts of Africa where sickle cell disease is the most prevalent worldwide and where we seek to advance. Our first African connection was a research relationship with Dr. Mor Diaw, MD, PhD., from Senegal Africa. Dr. Diaw is a professor at Cheikh Anta Diop University, Dakar (UCAD) and a practicing hematologist with many sickle cell patients. Our first research activity was to field test Sickle Confirm, our first patented low-cost test for sickle cell disease developed in my research lab at SLU. Dr. Diaw's research team has completed the data collection. The data looks excellent and we are currently preparing a manuscript for publication.

Dr Diaw and I have commenced two follow-up studies to field test two other low-cost tests developed in my lab called HbC Assay and Zygotest.

In the meantime, Dr. Diaw is planning a trip to St. Louis in the spring to train again in my lab on the manufacturing procedures for Sickle Confirm. Our goal is for Dr. Diaw to manufacture Sickle Confirm in country to make the testing available in the Senegal area and beyond. He is planning the timing of his trip so he can share our research data with the RWM family at the Annual Fundraising Banquet this spring.

For the people of Haiti. Pray for their safety and protection. Pray for their emotional and mental health as they endure the constant threats of violence all around them.


