Note from Tim and Liz

It has been a year and a half since our last newsletter; my apologies. The reason for the delay can be summarized as Joshua Charles Randolph.



In case you are not aware, on March 11, 2015 Liz gave birth to our second son (first biological) who has been all consuming. He is beautiful, hefty, happy, and very DEMANDING!!!! But we still decided to keep him ;-)

I am writing this newsletter while in Haiti as sweat pours off my wrists and elbows. It is hot here. Nonetheless, we have big plans and much left to do. During week one we serviced 7 clinics; conducted the free mass screening program for 5 different lab tests on 148 patients; collected data on our patented sickle cell test; and evaluated two new tests for tuberculosis well suited for Haiti. During week two we evaluated a new hospital in Pierre Payan; partnered with Project Help Haiti on a mobile clinic in the mountain village of Jesse where we saw about 220 patients; conducted training on the manual manufacturing of our sickle cell test; and discussed the possibility of accepting a land donation in Haiti to establish a sickle cell treatment center. The final week we conducted a mobile clinic in the village of Grand Vide on the island of LaGonave, Haiti with our good friends Brian and Heather Tucker, where we treated nearly

500 patients.



We can't thank you enough for choosing to partner with us. Without you, we could do very little for the beautiful people of Haiti. Praise be to God!!!

The 2016 winter team worked hard for 2 weeks just after Christmas as we serviced 7 clinics; conducted the mass screening program; conducted the initial training for the manual manufacturing center for our sickle cell test (Sickle Confirm); and collected data to improve Sickle Confirm.

The work of the summer team was described in the "Note from Tim & Liz" and the team members changed as the trip progressed. The first week comprised of a team of three: Tim, Jessica Lee and Zen Catalan (See picture below)



At the end of week one we

lost Jessica and Zen but gained Liz, returning team member Carolyn McCaffery (a medical laboratory scientist), and Emily Waller (a medical assistant). Prior to traveling to the island of LaGonave for week three, we were joined by Dr. Michel-Ange Ferdinand who is a Haitian/American physician with much experience serving the medical needs of the Haitian people. Of course Abraham, (Jean Claude Louikes Abraham) our Haitian Field Director, served with us the entire trip and continues to pour himself in to all our activities.

The next picture includes the week 2 Randolph World Ministries, Inc. team, the Tuckers (Brian and Heather), and several residents of the village of Grand Vide who served an invaluable role in registering and triaging the patients, managing the waiting room, serving as translators, and contributing



in a variety of ways.

Together this team accomplished much to improve the operations of seven clinic partners, collect valuable medical data, and service the people of Haiti directly through our mobile clinics.

Once again we met all our goals on the summer trip. We were able to deliver training to the medical staff, further develop the sickle cell manufacturing center, and deliver healthcare to over 700 patients in areas of Haiti in which healthcare does not exist. The team was amazing and the Lord blessed us in innumerable ways.

Women's Health Program

We have been fundraising for a CryoPen with a GYN probe to allow Liz to treat women with abnormal but non-cancerous cervical lesions detected on PAP analysis. I am proud to report that we have raised enough to purchase the instrument. We plan to acquire the instrument in the next few months and receive the necessary training so Liz can begin to use it the next time we visit Haiti.

Most patients we have screened have been normal but several have been identified with lesions that are treatable using the CryoPen that will potentially cure the lesions BEFORE they turn to cancer.

Thus far we have found only one patient with a cancerous lesion who was referred for surgery. Recently we have identified two Haitian surgeons who have volunteered to receive our surgical referrals. ***This is a major answer to prayer!***

Hurricane Matthew Devastation Update

Hurricane Matthew, which made landfall on Haiti on Tuesday, October 4th, hit with fervor, but only 5% of the country, concentrated in the Southwest peninsula, was totally devastated. Most of the country weathered the storm



with its resources intact, which will help the country aid in its own recovery. RWM is focusing its efforts in two areas: the village of Croix Hilare in the SW peninsula, and an area on the island of La Gonave.

We are sending a team of Haitians led by Jean Claude Abraham

to the village of Croix Hilare in this hard hit area of the Southwest peninsula to feed the victims and help them clean up after the storm.

We are also investing our resources in the Haitian island of La Gonave. We have a direct connection to the village of Grand Vide where we have delivered mobile clinics on two separate occasions this past year. We are currently helping to provide food



and water and in the long term our efforts will subsequently convert

to helping them rebuild their homes, their gardens (which is their primary source of food), their fishing enterprises, and their livestock.

As per our ministry model, we are purchasing as many resources to aid in the recovery as we can from local businesses to stimulate the economy. As far as we know, the water purification centers can keep up with demand as long as there are adequate funds to purchase the water.

In this issue we would like to spotlight Bob Croker, Director of Travel for the past five years. Behind the scenes Bob works diligently, accurately, and quickly to plan our trips to Haiti. Bob coordinates with me to set the trip dates, after which he surveys several airlines with the dates to select the best airline, fares, and Florida city from which to travel. He then books our flights to and from Haiti along with hotels in both directions. He registers our trips with the US Embassy in Haiti and purchas-

es our travel, health, and emergency evacuation insurance. He then creates an itinerary for each team member that is emailed and mailed by hard copy to each team member. He also works with me to create the spreadsheet that summarizes and tallies the costs for each team member. Most importantly, Bob serves as our US problem solver should we encounter travel problems. I recall one particular trip where the airline we booked round trip decided to discontinue flights to Haiti while we were

still in Haiti, thus cancelling our return flight. With just a few days left in our trip and no flight home, Bob worked feverishly to rebook us, to communicate with the airline to verify the situation, survey other flights to get us home on time without breaking the bank, and he negotiated with the original airline about refunding our fares. He truly deserved a red cape and tights that year because he was our superhero. *Thank you Bob for your years of dedication and EXCELLENT service.*
